Editorial from Rotary Down Under

RELEGATING POLIO TO THE HISTORY PAGES

DEAR fellow Rotarians,

Some years ago, in the Melbourne Museum where my daughter used to work, an iron lung was on display. For most people my age who remembered

the terrifying polio epidemics of the 1950s, that iron lung was a testament to how far vaccination had brought us: to the point where that once-critical piece of medical equipment had literally become a museum piece.

For much of the world, the story of polio is a simple one: After years of fear, a vaccine was developed and a disease was conquered. But for some of the world, the story was different. In so many countries, the vaccine wasn't available, mass vaccination was too expensive, or children simply couldn't be reached. While the rest of the world relegated polio to its museums, in these countries, the disease continued to rage – until Rotary stepped forward and said that all children, no matter where they lived or what their circumstances, deserved to live free of polio. In the years since *PolioPlus* was launched, the combined efforts of Rotary, the governments of the world and the Global Polio Eradication Initiative have brought the number of cases of polio down from an estimated 350,000 per year to just a few so far in 2017. But we must reach zero cases, and stay there, to achieve eradication. To do that, we need everyone's help.

On October 24, we will mark World Polio Day. It is a day to celebrate how

far we have come and an opportunity for all of us to raise awareness and funds to complete the work of eradication. I ask every Rotary club to participate in some way in World Polio Day activities, and I encourage you to visit endpolio.org for ideas and to register your event. Whether you host a silent auction, a virtual reality viewing, a fundraising walk, or a Purple Pinkie Day, your club can make a real difference.

This year, our World Polio Day livestream event will take place at the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation headquarters in Seattle; you can watch it on endpolio.org beginning at 2:30pm Pacific time. As many of you know, Rotary has committed to raising \$50 million a year for the next three years. This amount

will be matched two to one by the Gates Foundation – effectively tripling the value of all money Rotary raises on World Polio Day and throughout the year. Let's all make a difference on World Polio Day – and help *End Polio Now*.

Profile: Lessons for a new life

If I report a crime, can the police officer deport me? When I get a cold, should I go to the hospital? Is it all right to spit in the street? For many refugees in a new country, the answers to those and many other questions aren't obvious.

That's why Alison Sutherland has been helping asylum seekers learn the customs of their new nation. "We want to set them up for integration rather than isolation," Sutherland says.

Wales is home to several thousand displaced people from Eritrea, Libya, Syria, Iraq, Iran, Uganda, and other countries. Upon seeking asylum, they must wait as long as a year for a hearing to determine if they qualify for official refugee status.

Life during that time is extremely frustrating for them, Sutherland says: "They're not allowed to work. Meanwhile, of course, they are very afraid. Their journeys have been horrendous."

Sutherland, assisted by two members of the City of Cardiff Rotaract Club, regularly meets with asylum seekers to discuss topics such as the role of women in Welsh society, the justice system, and local customs.

"Some of them have started volunteering with Rotary and Rotaract also," she says.

"They've helped us with street cleaning, blood pressure events, face painting, tree planting. They say that we've given them welcome and respect."

Volunteers Notes – Launceston Show 12th, 13th & 14th
October 2017

1. Thank you for your support, the following notes should help you get started when you arrive at the show.
2. You will be given a fluoro vest and rotary cap on arrival at your post. These must be worn! If you have a club t-shirt or jacket please wear them. For non-rotary volunteers South Launceston tees are yellow and jackets blue.
3. You are requested to attend your shift 15 minutes before the other shift finishes; this is to ensure you have time to learn the ropes before taking control. Please don't be late as we will be under pressure to work smoothly.
4. Ticket sales – Adult \$15.00; Child \$6.00; Concession \$11.00; Family (2x2) \$35.00; Friday night "\$5.00 after 5pm" for adults & children
Tickets are off the roll. They vary in colour but will have
 - Adult, Child, Concession or Family printed on them.
 - Friday night tickets will be one ticket (for adults & children)
5. Concessions include: Pensioners, Disability, TPI.
Please Note **NO concessions for students**
6. For security ticket sellers will lock themselves in.
7. Gate collectors – be prepared for wet and/or cold weather (it is show week!!!!)
8. Gate collectors must collect tickets as patrons enter. These must be retained in the collection bags\buckets you will be



given, as they will be used to tally with the money from ticket sales.

9. Pre-sold tickets (Ex Wills Group – Telstra Shop & Heritage Isle Credit Union) are collected at the gate. These must also be retained. There are several versions of pre-sold tickets. Most will be Wills / Heritage sold tickets which are hard cardboard, business card size (similar to the Show tickets), which clearly show adult, child, concession or family. Other pre-sold tickets are: -

- Red and white and clearly show their category.
- Tickets not collected are member's tickets, which have a T F and S on the bottom and are to be punched for the appropriate day.
- Other tickets not collected are Judges and Exhibitor's tickets

10. Security will be present at all gates. There will be two-way communications at each gate.

11. Exhibitors Gate – All entrants must have an official pass or red ticket, if not those at EX1 must enter through one of the two public gates i.e. the Rail Spur Gate or the Forster St.- Market Gate. There will be some tickets available at Ex2. There is no entry through the Jim Bacon Gates.

12. Gates open for exhibitors, officials etc at 6:00am. General public entry is from 8.30am. Gates close at 4:30pm

13. There will be a stamp for pass outs at the two main gates. The stamp will differ each day both in letter and colour. **No Pass Outs from midday Friday (common sense prevails)**

14. Gate locations are as follows:

- Rail Spur Gate (between Uni School of Architecture building and Aurora Stadium and past Café Blue);
- Forster (Market entrance) - off Forster Street;
- Exhibitor (dog, cat, horse) – Just west of Forster Street gate in Forster St.



15. Carers of disabled attendees get free entry.

16. Disabled groups and school groups will have letters of admission. They will indicate the number to be admitted. These letters must go in the bucket. There will be a receipt book at each gate if required.

17. I hope this helps. All others questions will be answered either at club meetings or by your sponsor/recruiter. On the day Steve Gordon / Dale Luck / Graeme LeFevre will handle any queries / issues. Their mobiles are:-
