I know that you are all very busy, trying desperately to sort your lives, your futures, families, work and businesses now whilst maintaining the necessary social distancing to self-isolation rules, which are imperative to prevent the spread of COVID -19

As you are all aware, I am a registered nurse and work in the role as After-Hours Nurse Manager at the Launceston General Hospital. In my role, I am the overall site manager of the hospital. I care greatly for our staff. It is the doctors and nurses who will save your lives or the life of your loved ones. I am now on call 24/7 working with them all. We are all committing ourselves to you and are privileged to be able to do this for you all.

I am currently developing a newsletter with Elisha Summers our graphic designer. This newsletter will keep you all up to date with what is happening to our people both in Tarime and here. I am also very active on social media, both individually and with Care for Africa. I have a strong presence with Facebook, LinkedIn and Instagram.

If anyone has any ideas or would like to write something for our newsletter please let me know, I welcome all your wonderful thoughts, support and happenings.

It is important that we keep Care for Africa alive. Our people are in our hearts and deserve the best of what we can give them. Last night we held a board meeting. Our board is committed to our people and the future of Care for Africa, for which I am incredibly grateful for and in appreciation of. Our board will continue to meet via teleconference, which has been set up through Zoom.

Tanzania has closed its borders. Twelve cases are now confirmed in Tanzania. More than 2,000 COVID -19 cases have now been confirmed in Africa.

I am in discussion with Abdallah, the Care for Africa Coordinator in Tanzania, to set up the Bisarwi women to make masks for the Tanzanian Government's hospitals and health facilities.

We are hoping to complete "Jo's House of Love." If we are able to this will provide a safe haven for many of the women and children, in particular those that will have no home or family.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank you all for working with me to set up our integrated program of water (and sanitation), health, education and enterprise. The people that we have set this up with, will hopefully have a chance of surviving this pandemic if they adhere to the social distancing rules. This model creates sustainability because it is driven from the people, enables self-reliance, dignity, and has positive and lasting impact with every community member that it reaches.

Thank you enabling this vital program. This program, your program, will hopefully save many lives in our Tarime communities during this COVID -19 pandemic.

Abdallah and his family are well. They are totally aware and understand the short term and long-term consequences of this dire COVID -19 situation. Johari, Safina and Diana have chosen to self-isolate at our wonderful centre. Abdallah only leaves the centre to collect essential supplies for his family and keep an eye on our community people and their needs. I am in constant contact with Abdallah and consequently our people in Tarime.

As a result of COVID-19, much of the fundraising has been suspended. Donations are desperately needed to support the wage of Abdullah—\$12,500 is needed. If you can help, go to www.careforafrica.org.au and click on 'Donate Today'.
