



LAST WEEK'S GUEST SPEAKER.


The guest speaker at last week's Zoom meeting was our own Nick Butler. Nick gave us part one of a Powerpoint presentation of his trip to Russia last year. He travelled with his daughter and some friends.

His trip suffered a slight delay when he arrived in Sydney and discovered he'd brought the wrong passport!

He travelled to Moscow via Seoul and Helsinki. He was there for a month—tourist visas are issued for 30 days only.

The first day in Moscow was a public holiday—Red Square was awash with garlic sausage and vodka. He visited an historical building which is now a very large shopping centre featuring men on trikes selling ice cream.





Nick and his friends visited St Basil's cathedral, which was absolutely spectacular, Nick said. Each dome is a separate room and is lavishly decorated. The party also visited the State Historical Museum and the Kremlin Museum. They were even more lavishly decorated—each door and ceiling different. There was an abundant display of wealth—large jewels, a gold covered bible, a large gold and silver meat tray and a seven foot diameter globe which predated Australia and New Zealand.. One ceiling featured the czars' family tree. There were also stone carving displays. At the end of the day, Nick said he was suffering from cultural overload!

Nick's party then travelled by train to southern Siberia and the Altai mountain area to begin an 11 day, 1,100 km walk. The train passed through pastureland and over a number of rivers—the River Ob was massive. They passed red currant, silver birch and pine plantations.

The walk experience was similar to bushwalks in Tasmania, Nick said. The Belukha mountains were snow-capped and straddle the border with Kazakhstan. They required permits to visit the area. People ride the trails on horseback as well as walking them. They swam in one lake, but found the water a trifle chilly! They were awoken one morning by a rocket, which turned out to be a Chinese ICBM test. They passed through some quite





with volcanic rocks and waterfalls encountered. They also passed many lakes, often snow-fed and strikingly blue—some with amazing reflections.

Nick said that the food provided to the walkers was not exciting—mostly canned meat and fish. They encountered a stone labyrinth and prayer poles were a feature at the top of passes. River crossings varied from wobbly suspension bridges to single logs and ferries.

In one area, blue Aquilegia flowers were in abundance.

We will look forward to part two of Nick's account of his trip.
