Decorum Issue:


I believe the Chairperson of the night needs to be proactive regarding members' rudeness when they talk over any person who may have the floor at the time. This problem seems to be getting worse.

LAST WEEK'S GUEST SPEAKER.

Last week's guest speaker was Past-President Dale Luck. Dale's subject was 'Geomorphology'. To the uninitiated, geomorphology is an observation of landform history and a study of how landscapes have evolved over millions of years to reach their current form. As a civil engineer, Dale's interest has been in the Tamar Valley and Central North area of Tasmania. Dale said his interest was originally sparked by the fact that Mt Arthur, Mt Barrow and Ben Lomond were in a straight line. A similar scenario can be observed with the Western Tiers.

Dale said that the earth's age has been estimated at 4.6 billion years. The Mid-Present Period geologically has been determined to be from 600 to 200 million years ago. The

Present Period is regarded as from 200 million years ago to the present day. The earth's diameter is 12,700 kilometres and the earth's crust is 32 kilometres thick. Below the crust is the mantle, then the outer core and the inner core. The outer core is liquid which sometimes comes to the surface in volcanic eruptions.

Dale said that the rock in the Tamar Valley is mainly dolerite or bluestone. About 65 million years ago, faults occurred and the layer suffered a number of breaks. The softer stone on the surface then eroded. The movement in the dolerite formed a freshwater lake in a valley with Mt Arthur, Mt Barrow and Ben Lomond on one side and the Western Tiers on the other. The lake eventually gave way to the Tamar River.

Dale said that in some places, such as the site for the proposed Gorge Hotel, solid rock is 200 metres below the surface, while in other places it is only 30 metres below.

The area of Inveresk is comprised of recent sediment, which incudes clay washed down from the mountains, whereas in Trevallyn the clay has formed in situ. Much of the land in the Tamar Valley is unstable, which proves to be a challenge for engineers and builders.

Dale showed by means of a photo and a map that the South Esk River used to flow into the North Esk River south of Evandale. A feature called Cocked Hat Hill near Evandale is an old volcano. Its eruption many years ago dammed the South Esk River and caused it to change course to where it flows today.
