Cancer Council Speaker

A few weeks ago we had Zoe Vandervelde from the Cancer Council Tasmania as Guest Speaker and to present a donation of \$1000.

Zoe took a few questions on notice which are answered below:

Most frequently diagnosed cancer: Most common cancer types in Tasmania are – Prostate, Breast, Melanoma, Bowel and Lung.

Recovery Rates: rates vary depending on cancer type, e.g. 5 year survival rates for breast and prostate cancer are over 90%, while lung cancer sits at 20%.

Water Bores for Tanzania project

Advised the Club that Harry's daughter, Jacqueline, raised money for Movember this year by solo canoeing from Launceston to Low Head – a great effort! The website is still open for donations

Pastoral – Ian S.

Ian went to see Henry Harris at Peacehaven Nursing Home last week – he looks well, and is in good spirits. Limited mobility. Greta is moving into her unit there on Monday. They pass on Christmas greetings.

Last week's guest speaker was our own Phil Niejalke, who gave an interesting account of his trip to the Northern Territory, principally to see his daughter Lora, who was working at Utopia or Arlparra at the time. (Laura is now working in Broome, W.A.) Phil, in the time allotted, was able to talk about only part of his journey, which took him to Melbourne in his vehicle and then to Adelaide, Kalgoorlie, Uluru (Ayers Rock), The Olgas, Kings Canyon, Alice Springs, the Tanami Track, Hall's Creek, Kakadu and Darwin. Phil intended to travel to Mt Isa, but road conditions forced him to back-track to Katherine, Tennant Creek, Coober Pedy and then home – a distance of 18,000 km.

Phil carried a swag in which he mostly slept under the stars, a 40 litre extra fuel can, an extra spare tyre, a solar panel and stove. Phil said that when he crossed from South Australia into Western Australia, it was difficult to know what the time was, as different devices he was carrying were giving different readings.

When Phil visited Ceduna, he took time to visit the old telegraph station there and then walk a short distance to the cliff overlooking the Great Australian Bight – a spectacular view. He showed the photo of the sign indicating the 90 mile straight section of the Eyre Highway.

From Kalgoorlie Phil travelled to Leonora and then undertook a 1,000 km drive to Uluru where he stayed in a very well maintained caravan park. Phil said he didn't see any native animals on the route from Leonora to Uluru. Phil found the Olgas quite spectacular, as well as the Ayers Rock sunset experience. A 250 km trip took Phil on to Kings Canyon, which was an outstanding experience, which included views of rock wallabies.

After arriving at Alice Springs, Phil visited the Transport Hall of Fame, where he was able to find a commemorative photo and information featuring the late Max Watkins, our former club member.

Phil then travelled along the Sandover Highway to Utopia or Arlparra, where Laura was a nurse at the modern local health clinic. There is no doctor there, so nurses have to respond to medical emergencies and seek advice from the flying doctor as needed. One such emergency arose while Phil was there, which involved a vehicle rollover, badly injuring the driver. Three other emergency situations arose at the same time and Phil was quickly drafted in to help.

Phil was able to sample some bush tucker at various stages of his journey. He had much more information to share about his experiences, but that will have to wait for another time!



MESSAGE FROM THE DISTRICT GOVERNOR

Most Group Forums have now been completed. Those Rotarians who participated around the State have had the opportunity to hear amazing stories about Rotary projects in Tasmania that have an impact locally, around Australia and overseas. Each forum tried new ideas unique to its Group, all were very successful and added to the fellowship experienced. I am in awe of the projects and service our Clubs undertake and the links that Clubs create within their communities. I am constantly reminded that it is the projects we do that defines Rotarians and that our meetings are just the means by which we make those projects possible. Rotary is first and foremost a service organisation. Congratulations to the Assistant District Governors and Club Presidents who have made these forums so successful.

The District Project this year is Domestic Violence Awareness. The consequences of Domestic Violence can affect us all and every Rotarian has a responsibility to spread the message that Domestic Violence in its many forms, is not acceptable and has to stop. The perpetrator, their victim, the children in the family, the extended family and their friends and neighbours are all impacted, some for the rest of their life. Only last week I heard of an older father/grandfather who was hospitalised trying to defend his daughter from physical attack by her partner. The impact on those who support victims is also significant.

Over the last week and into next week Rotarians around Zone 8 (Australia, New Zealand and the Pacific Islands) have been trying to create awareness of these consequences. Some have done this within their Clubs and other Clubs have run activities in partnership with community groups. Last week there was a community walk in Devonport, this week one in Ulverstone and next week, one in Smithton. Thank you to all those Clubs who have already participated in this project. It is not too late to arrange guest speakers from local community organisation in this field or to raise money to help provide services for those impacted. I hope Clubs continue to find ways to spread awareness.

During November the District leadership Team agreed to use \$10,000 from our Rotary Foundation funds to support a District 9705 Mental Health Project in Uganda. This project has strong links with Tasmania through the mentoring role of Dr Jenny Kerrison from RC of North Hobart and the ongoing support of the Rotary Club of Devonport South East.

A reminder for anyone thinking of attending the Rotary International Convention in Singapore, May 25th-29th 2024. This is a wonderful way to find out more about Rotary and Rotary Projects and to also meet some amazing people from all over the world. If you enjoyed Melbourne 2023 or if you missed it and want to attend a Rotary World event, this is a great opportunity attend one close to home. The Early Bird Discount ends on December the 15th so if you plan to attend, it makes sense to book before that date. Flights are also cheaper done sooner rather than later. We also need somebody who is attending to act as the official point of contact for District 9830. Please get in touch with me if you are interested in doing that role. At the moment we have six Tasmanians booked. It would be great to have a few more than that attending. You can always find the latest convention information at convention.rotary.org.


